Our Iconic Building of the Month is The Washington Monument in


It is 555 feet 5 1/8 inches tall. The walls are 125 feet thick at the base and 1.5 feet thick at the top. The walls of the pyramid are only 7 1/2 inches thick.

The apex is an aluminum pyramid with inscriptions on each side some of which are still legible.


Iconic Building Of The Month

Washington Monument, DC

The Washington Monument was built to commemorate Georg Washington. In 1836 the Washington National Monument Society announced a competition for the design of the monument. In 1845 it was announced that a Baltimore architect, Robert Mills and his design was ultimately selected. The original design by Robert Mills was very different than what we have today. His original design was of a Greek column and included a colonnade around the base with a statue of Washington at the top. There was much criticism of Mills design and the estimated costs exceed the equivalent in today's dollars of twenty million dollars. The Society requested Mills to redesign it which he did.




Interior North Wall with its stair and wire screen. *Photo credits:Wikipedia*




Monument Plans and timeline of construction

The monument is constructed of marble, granite and bluestone with an iron stair case within it. It is the tallest predominantly stone structure in the world and the world's tallest obelisk. It is the tallest monumental column in the world if all are measured above their pedestrian entrances. At the time of its completion it was the tallest structure in the world from 1884 through 1888. At approximately 150 feet up or 27% of its total height from the bottom there is a clearly visible different shade of stone used. This marks the suspension of construction between 1848 and 1888 due to lack of funds, struggle of control of the Washington Monument Society and the intervention of the Civil War. When construction was restarted the exterior marble was provided by a different source.

The American Institute of Architects at its most recent convention voted to include in the ethics of an architect to strive towards designing all buildings as "net zero" buildings. This means it is now an ethical obligation for architects to show their clients ways to attain "net zero" building designs. A "net zero" building is one which when measuring the total energy consumption of the building on an annual basis is roughly equal to the amount of renewable energy created on the site of the building. This will reduce our need for fossil fuels and thereby reduce the creation of carbon dioxide in our atmosphere.

This is now completely doable with off the shelf technology and will save our clients extremely large amounts of money over time and help stem the global rise in temperatures. In the words from the Constitution of the United States of America we owe this ... "to ourselves and our Posterity.

The monument was competed ion December 6th, 1884 with the dedication on February 21st 1885 and officially opened on October 9th, 1888.
